## **4<sup>th</sup> National Consultation Meeting Report**

### **Children Movement for Climate Justice**

Children Movement for Climate Justice – a National Movement led by children and youth - are drawn from various child focussed Rights Based development organisations who are partners to Kindernothilfe, Germany. Children and Youth from CMCJ have meaningfully engaged in various interventions in addressing climate change and its implications to Child Rights through strengthening the mitigation, adaptation and advocacy processes using participatory approaches since 2008.

- CMCJ is a registered society under TN societies act 1975 with No : 15/2015 and also registered with Income Tax Act under section 12AA (No : CAC1314N/ 05 /15-15/S - 0574)
- Currently there are close to 6,000 plus members spread across four States of India.
- Kindernothilfe recognised the efforts of children and accepted this children led organisation as pioneering of its kind under Partner No :2022
- CMCJ strongly advocate for meaningful participation and engagement of children and youth in all issues concerning their Rights Realisation including Ecological Justice
- CMCJ endeavour to facilitate effective coordination of children and youth to participate in various policy advocacy processes related to decisions governing them towards sustainable development and other allied processes.
- CMCJ strive to ensure diversity and inclusion of as many children and youth as possible, keeping the process open and taking into account their background factors specially the vulnerability level, gender, disability, marginalised groups and type of organisation

### **Introduction**

The 4<sup>th</sup> National Consultation Meeting which was held on 23<sup>rd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> January 2016, where 116 Participants who are members of the National working committee, State level committees from Odisha, Andhra and Tamilnadu along with members on the official board of CMCJ at Visthar, Bangalore. The meeting also included Rev.Guido Falkenberg – India Team Leader Kindernothilfe, Germany, Mr.Sathish Samuel - KNH India co-ordinator , Dr. James



Arputharaj– KNH Country Head , Dr. John Devavaram – CMCJ National convenor , Dr Sasi Praba, Mr Sushant Stanley and Mr Nirmal Raja State convenors of Andra, Odisha, and Tamilnadu, Ms. Deepika – National Co-ordinator ,Co-ordinators of all three States and heads of few partner organisations.



The 4<sup>th</sup> National Consultation of Children Movement for Climate Justice was opened with warm welcome note by Mr Dennyson James, who is the Chair Person on the Board. Mr James recalled the evolution of the Movement, milestones crossed in the yester years, with special acknowledgement for the National and State co-ordinators for their tireless contribution in taking the Movement forward as well strengthening the Movement across the member States. A special welcome extended to Rev. Guido Falkenberg from KNH Germany and Mr Sathish Samuel who is the India Co-ordinator for their presence and support through the past years with outgoing trust in realising the Participatory Rights of children. The welcome note included with acknowledgement the contributions of all KNH Partner Directors, Ms Stegna Jency, who is member on the National Trainer team for evolving Child Protection Policy and Rev. Dr. David Selvaraj and Visthar team who accommodated this event here at Visthar.

This was followed by a two minutes silent prayer called by Mr.Sathish Samuel jointly with all the members present to observe tribute to the former director Mr Amar Thomas, who entered the eternal glory of our Lord, in remembrance of his great contributions to the development sector and Child Rights.

Subsequently Mr.Sathish Samuel introduced the new KNH India Team and welcomed them for their first KNH exposure program in India. New members on the KNH India team include the following personnel having sound track record in development sector.

- Dr. James W. Arputharaj- Country Coordinator- KNH India
- Mr.Amit Choudhary- Program Head
- Ms.Kajal Bansal- Finance and Administration Head

- Ms.Kamalika- National Coordinator for Self Help Approach

Members of CMCJ (National and State Committee members) had the best opportunity to showcase their earlier work of the Movement as well interact with the new team. The platform opened conducive atmosphere, smooth mutual learning opportunity and better understanding to the new team members of KNH as well to those children who had come for the first time.

This was followed by dignitaries lighting the lamp jointly with State Co-ordinators as mark of a bright positive start of the event.



Dr. John Devavaram, CMCJ National Convenor, gave an outline about the two days program drawing from the resolutions made at the 3<sup>rd</sup> National consultation held at New Delhi and . set the way forward into the 4<sup>th</sup> national consultation including the draft agenda for floor approval. Key issues drawn from the 3<sup>rd</sup> consultation include....

- Getting State Chapter's input for the Child Protection Policy for the CMCJ children
- Collection of annual subscription fee from the members and its accountability for programs
- Strengthening official structure i.e.; Legal committee and National / State level committees with adequate representation of member states.
- Preparing draft program focus for the next five years project to be submitted to KNH for their funding consideration. (2016 - 2021)
- Membership –concern over frequent change of members on the National and State level committees due to various reasons and expanding CMCJ to other States. It is also recalled that the decision at the 3<sup>rd</sup> consultation to ensure elected office bearers remain in office for a minimum period of two years without change, except for unforeseen and unavoidable reasons.



- Follow up OP3 Signature appeal- State / Partners organisation meet their respective local M.P's and have a discussion about the appeal and submission of 1,80,000 signature for the forthcoming Parliamentary session as advocacy measure..

This was followed by members from each of the State chapter singing song related to environment, child rights and climate change. The highlight of the singing session was the special song given by Ms Hannah, a volunteer from Germany, in German with translations related to children and their rights.



### **Special Address**



Rev. Guido Falkenberg, India Team Leader, KNH Germany delivered his remarks on the Movement as special partner to KNH and a pioneering effort of its kind across all KNH partners as children led National level movement. He appreciated all the children who have grown with the movement in the past years and are now youth and office bearers on the Board of CMCJ, partner organisation leaders who created space for these children



to exercise their participatory rights. In his speech he did convey his greetings from KNH Germany. He also translated the motto of KNH and related the same to the work of CMCJ and children as Child centred Rights based agency.

Key message from Rev Guido include the following.....

- Child participation in the development projects should not be seen as mere adult driven participation but an active participation of the child him/herself which endeavour to exercise the Right from child's perception.
- Thus there is no master and uniform plan for how to make children participate effectively, but it has to consider the local context and feasibility while the feeble voice of vulnerable and marginalised children are heard in the process
- Children are the Right holders and adults are Duty bearers
- Children should not be taking the roles of adults, just because in most cases the adults as Duty bearers do not do their duty properly. Children should be responsible for their roles.
- Basically KNH expects that children are involved with true participation spirit and not mixing up the roles.
- He encouraged members of CMCJ and the National/State committee members for their creative advocacy initiative in pursuing Government of India to ratify OP3 with 1,80,000 signatures, saying that KNH proudly published the effort in the official website of KNH Germany
- Now that CMCJ is one of the official partners of KNH so KNHG has high expectations and willing to take forward the More guards.

### **Felicitation by India Co-ordinator**

Mr. Sathish Samuel was invited to give the felicitation address. He thanked Rev. Guido for his encouraging words and support during all these years in building and strengthening the Children led Movement.

Mr. Sathish Samuel recalled the evolution of CMCJ as it stemmed out of Right based child friendly initiatives by various Direct Partners of KNH and creating space for effective child participation through various child friendly institutional arrangements such as Palar Panchayats, Child Clubs, Child Ambassadors, Balakeerthi, etc.



- During 2007, few children who were active in some of the children front Right based initiatives which is part of the Child Rights Approach, joined the official KNH Direct Partners meet and shared their experience in learning Good Governance, group management, Rights realisation by being members of Palar Panchayat and other child clubs.
- Taking this as lead, for the first time around 40 children were invited to share their experience in relation to Child Rights and the scope of them working together through mutual and peer learning experience.
- Subsequently Dr John Devavaram, Director of RCPDS and Mr Thomas Jayaraj, Director of CCRD who were also the official trainers of KNH for institutionalising Child Rights Approach among KNH partners in India, Srilanka and Bangladesh, facilitated a tailor made special training event for representative children from few potential partner NGOs.
- The idea of children expanding their purview on Ecological Rights and reflecting on the implications of climate change to overall child rights was further brainstormed on the way back from Semliguda, after one of the partners meeting.
- Thus the small initiative of CMCJ which was started with 60 to 70 children in December 2008 at Tiruchuli, Virudunagar District gradually became inclusive to accommodate many other forms of children groups which were promoted by many partners of KNH and especially across peers in few States.
- Having observed the effective functioning of the children led initiative and various demonstrations made by children through human chain, signature campaign, etc., in 2011, Rev Guido announced in one of the partners meeting that CMCJ can be taken as one of the official partners of KNH since this is a unique type of children led initiative and which can really demonstrate the spirit of child participation..
- Since then CMCJ is officially recognized as one of the partners with partner No.2022 and Dr. John Devavaram, being the pioneer in promoting the movement assigned the role as the National convenor and Mr Nirmal Raja, Dr Sasi Praba, Mr Sushant Stanley were made as State Conveners for Tamilnadu, Andra Pradesh and Odisha respectively..
- Since then the Movement has made many progresses in the legal status as well expanding as a National network with close to 5,000 plus members.



## Evolution of CMCJ

KNH Partners initiated forming a small Children group in their Working areas

Participation Rights of children realized through Palar Panchayat, Child Club, Green Ambassador, Balakeerthi etc.

(2007) 40 children, Facilitate to assert their rights through CRA (KNH Partners Meeting)

Children from jointly with SHG – APEX Bodies & CRPC

Made a small beginning as children led initiative in VNR 2008

Gradually spread to other partners and states Facilitated by reflection KNH Partners in 2009 /10

2011 Rev. Guido announced CMCJ as one partners in the KNH partners Meeting with Partners No: 2022

Since then serve as independent children led

Mr. Sathish further stressed on few areas

- Eventually CMCJ should become hundred per cent children and youth led organization and not adult led organization. They should gradually start functioning independent of other facilitating organisation and independent on their own
- CMCJ should set a viable model organization for any future children led organisation and scale up to many more States. The partners meet which happened at Christ University shows how far the children are involved. They were also able to answer all the questions asked by the adults on the floor.
- CMCJ can spread across many of the new direct partners since they have witnessed the strength of children during the above meeting. Hence the National and State chapters should increase the member base and children from all the other partners should also be invited for future programs



This was followed by Ms. Deepika, CMCJ National Coordinator, giving a detailed background of CMCJ with doing a recap of the milestones over the earlier years. This is done to apprise the new members who were substituted in the State and National committee as well the new officers who have joined the KNH India office.

### **Broad vision of CMCJ**

- **Facilitate and enable our peers and future children** to emerge as strong gatekeepers of child rights protection and are able to claim their basic rights from within our families, communities and other stakeholders at all levels.
- To establish a workable model led by children to ensure climate justice rendered and make the earth liveable through scaling up the effort of Children movement for Climate Justice for children from other states to follow.

### **Overall Objectives**

- To ensure Ecological Rights of Children as part of overall Child Rights through appropriate awareness and advocacy measures whereby improve the quality of life with dignity with optimal use of natural resources on an equitable basis.

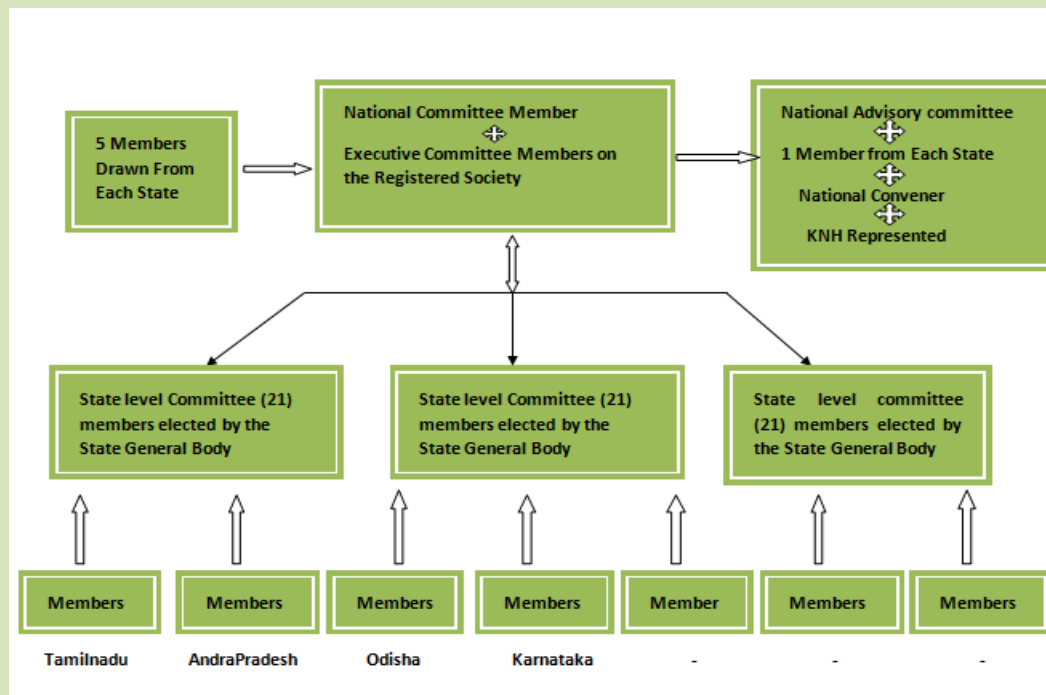
### **Specific objective:**

- To create broad base mass awareness on environmental issues, climate change, ecological rights and need for policy advocacy through appropriate children led initiatives.
- To strengthen children movement with institutionalised functional structure, from participatory rights perspective, from grassroots membership – District – State and National to make joint cross learning opportunity for appropriate adaptation and mitigation.
- To sensitize duty bearers and other stakeholders on the relevance of climate crisis with protection rights of the children and to call the attention of various levels of bureaucracy and policy power centres to review the policy framework

Ms Deepika, National Co-ordinator also presented the basic structure of CMCJ to get it reaffirmed and ratified by the floor. The floor reaffirmed the structure shown below as it included the concerned expressed in the 3<sup>rd</sup> National consultation which was held in New Delhi.



## Structure of CMCJ



Further the list of official members on the State and National Level committees, as it was sent by the respective co-ordinators (in concurrence with respective conveners) was presented to the floor. Further it was presented to the floor for discussion that any member, that is elected to the State or National committee should hold office for a minimum period of two years and not withdraw for any reasons, since CMCJ is now legally registered and is bound by the society relation and government norms. Hence, she requested the respective State members to review the names and possibly revise, if necessary, and ratify the same back at the State level committees. The final list need to be sent to the National office before the end of April 2016 and will be officially taken as approved during the forthcoming CPP 2<sup>nd</sup> phase workshop at Chennai in May 2016. (List of members is enclosed to Annex –3)

## Historical milestones crossed by CMCJ over the years

### 2007

- KNH Partners initiated forming children groups in their respective working areas and created a platform for children to come together and discuss the basic Rights using Child Rights Approach
- KNH continued to create space for children groups to participate at different forums

### 2008

- Child Clubs which were initiated by many of the KNH Partners with different names such as child clubs, Ambassador children, balakeerthi, Palar Panchayat, etc., facilitated

children to learn and practice “Good Governance” as well working closely with local Self Help Groups and their apex bodies.

- Exhibitions to bring out children talents, their perceptions around Child Rights and Climate change were organised in Tamilnadu at the Block Level at Tiruchuli, Virudunagar District and later in Chennai for school children across schools, especially Government schools in Tamilnadu
- CMCJ emerged as spontaneous offshoot of the above institutional framework, as a result of critical reflection of Child Rights from children perspective and as part of Child Rights Approach, using Palar Panchayat as their base in Virudunagar District.

## **2009**

- Experience shared by members of CMCJ at KNH partners meeting at Bangalore which paved way for consorted joint effort as children movement
- A book on “children for climate justice” was released by Mr Stefan, KNH and Ms.Ramathal, Chairperson of State Women Commission at the Children convention wherein children managed the event completely
- Signature campaign done by children across four states and presented through public human chain by children at Chennai and submitted an appeal and memorandum to Mayor of Chennai Corporation.
- Participatory study was done by CMCJ children from three districts in Tamilnadu, Andra pradesh and Odisha on various agro eco systems and livelihood patterns
- National ID format and other administration formats/templates developed and enrolment campaign launched with a view to scale up to district chapter
- Children from Andra Pradesh were involved in various studies and campaign activities across the State
- CMCJ children facilitated by RCPDS in Virudunagar District initiated an Ecological Learning Centre jointly with their Self help Groups, their Federation and PRI – 24 children are involved at the beginning of this initiative. This learning centre serve to provide hands on experience for children to learn various soil and water conservation measures, rain water harvest, alternate energy options, economic viable farming systems directly experimented by children in their assigned plots, etc. Over years more than 1260 children from KNH partner NGOs, local schools have visited the center where children serve s teachers and tutors for various climate mitigation efforts.
- 20 representatives participated in public hearing held at New Delhi on the concerns of Child Rights and Climate Crisis
- Members of CMCJ collected 100,000 plus signatures on cloth banners from across the Nation and this was initially demonstrated at New Delhi by children and later presented at COP 15 processes at Copenhagen, Denmark



## 2010

- Special meeting was held with Rev. Guido Falkenburg and other KNH partners/ officials on exploring the possibilities of scaling up CMCJ across States
- Children actively participated in KNH partners meeting at Bangalore and actively demonstrated their perceptions of CC and Child Rights and initiatives done by them in their respective areas.
- District level network beyond the donor boundaries initiated in Virudunagar with Human chain in 8 blocks while WWTC children organised rally at Block level in Tuticorin District of Tamilnadu
- Similarly a rally was organised in Visakapattinam, AP and memorandum submitted to District Collector
- Freshwater bio-diversity and Forest bio-diversity studies were conducted by the AP CMCJ chapter
- Efforts were taken to enable members to participate in COP 16 processes but unfortunately this did not materialise
- A National working group and task force committees for the State chapters were evolved at Creneo centre, Chennai

## 2011

- First National level working group meeting at Kodaikanal
- Ecological learning centre visited by Arogyagam, WWTC ,SANDS and HOTHs with International visitors from KNH Germany, KNH Bangladesh, KNH Srilanka
- Partner exchange programs and children cross learning programs initiated in Tamilnadu
- Study on Bio-diversity conservation – publication released along with Indigenous seed exhibition organised at Visakapatnam
- CMCJ accepted by KNH as independent partner with ID No. 2022 in one of the partners meeting held at Visakapatnam

## 2012

- National Yatra on raising awareness among general public organised for a week from Kanyakumari to Chennai and Odisha to Chennai with concluding meeting at Chennai in which more than 1000 children participated
- Green Peace volunteers visiting Andhra Pradesh and Tamilnadu chapters

## 2013

- Children making participatory study on forest eco-systems, tribal livelihoods and climate change along the western ghats region
- 10,000 saplings planted by CMCJ members across the country

- Children from Andhra Pradesh conducted a cycle rally to create awareness
- With a view to strengthen the organisational capacity of children a self reflective participatory tool called “spider tool” was introduced and well designed workshops were organised across member States.

## 2014

- Second National consultation held at Semiliguda, Odisha to finalise various structures of CMCJ
- CMCJ representative participated at the 14<sup>th</sup> KNH partners meeting
- Co-ordinators were appointed for the State chapters and National office.
- Strategies formulated for appropriate lobby advocacy to promote OP3CRC with series of orientation trainings were organised for signature campaign
- Initiatives were made to link CMCJ with the National Green Corps Movement which is in almost all schools as part of mainstreaming climate concerns among children.

## 2015

- CMCJ registered under the Tamil Nadu societies Act 1975
- Created website for CMCJ in the name of [www.cmcjindia.org](http://www.cmcjindia.org) and Facebook Pages for CMCJ.
- State level consultation were held in three of the member states of CMCJ - Tamil Nadu, Andhra Pradesh and Odisha.
- National Committee consisting of representatives drawn from the member states as identified by the State chapters met for the first time.
- 180,000 Signatures collected from across member states to pressurise Government of India to ratify OP3 to CRC as part of the lobby and advocacy efforts by CMCJ was submitted to Member of Parliament Mr. Udit Raj and Member of NCPCR at New Delhi.
- CMCJ representatives formed the Jury bench for the public hearing jointly organised with NCDHR on the discrimination against Dalit children in the context of Right to Education and basic rights violation/child protection.
- Third National consultation was held at New Delhi on the eve of public hearing.
- With regard to the registered Board, 3 General Body meeting and 2 Executive meeting were held and official returns were submitted to Government of Tamil Nadu, where it is registered.
- Children initiated and participated in various fact finding missions on Child Rights violations related to basic protection, sexual abuse, etc (Bore well death and Sexual Abuse) and presented their findings to media through press meet and National Public hearing.



CMCJ members observed important days like Environment day, Wild Life Day, Earth Day etc and created awareness programs on Environment, early child marriage, child protection and anti-child labor.

- Draft Child Protection Policy with the input of state and National committee members set for further refinement based on the inputs from CPP trainers.
- Full scale leadership program was organized for committee members of National and State committees at Chennai.
- To facilitate effective cross learning and use of information technology, a Google Group is formed and children share many information related to organization functioning, special events, local activities, magazine related to climate changes and case studies etc.
- Initiative is taken to produce a cartoon film to enable effective learning through visual medium and prepare the next level junior cadres to orient on the movement basis.
- Children actively participated in drawing competition which is organized by CMCJ National office in the topic of Child Rights and Ecological Rights.

### **Online updation and Social networking**

National Co-ordinator presented to the floor about the progress made with online updation of CMCJ activities, forthcoming events and membership database. More emphasis and highlights were shown on the newly started Google Group which is a gate way for direct sharing among members which will eventually facilitate members of CMCJ interacting among themselves beyond facilitating organisation but emerge as real independent participatory children led organisation.

## **Capacity Building Program**

During the last period three major capacity building events have been organised by the National Office jointly with State Chapters and KNH country office. These include the following –( soft copy of the full report can be downloaded from the Website)

- Website Training
- Leadership Training
- Child Protection Policy

### **Website Training**

- The website training was organised for the state members during the state level meeting. The main purpose of the training was to teach the children to surf the website and to make them aware know about the other state / partner activities and events details.
- Totally 62 members were presented and we have taught them the how to view the website, how to check the updates and what are the things in the database and how to download the particular database/ Identity card and also how to download the soft copy of the report from the website.

### **Leadership Training**

- Emerging Young Leader in “GO GREEN” Concept was organised on October 22-24, 2015 at YMCA, Vepery Chennai.
- Totally 47 members from National and state committee members are participated in this training and the main purpose was to improve their leadership skills.

### **Child Protection Policy**

- Child Protection Policy Workshop which was organised by KNH India and Facilitated by the National Trainer of Mr.Thomas Jeyraj and Ms.Stegana Jency at the CMCJ field office, Thiruchuli. Totally 34 CMCJ representative are participated in this workshop.
- . The main purpose of the training was to protect good practice, challenge practice that is abusive to children and ensure everyone works together to create a safe environment for children. In this workshop the CMCJ representative was drafted the CPP and understood the Policy.

### **Finalising the Child Protection Policy**

The drafted Child Protection Policy with correctional areas cited by the CPP Trainers during the first phase of CPP training exclusively held during October 22-24 2015 at CMCJ field office, Thiruchuli for CMCJ office bearers and committee members (State and National) was circulated back to members of CMCJ at the State and partner level. The outcome from the field was circulated and incorporated in to the version and presented at the 4<sup>th</sup> National consultation.

The correctional points that were discussed in small groups after the lunch break include.....

*Odisha CM CJ team came up with few more extra points that*

- No smoking or consuming alcohol near a child
- When a doctor is examining a child, the parents of the child should be near by
- Child protection officer should be from the local partner agency

*Andra Pradesh and Karnataka came up with their views*

- Each organization should have a separate CPO from CM CJ. (This was discussed in detail at the plenary and agreed that that the CPO of respective facilitating organisation will act as the CPO for CM CJ also)
- The legal punishment reference for child marriage should be brought in the CPP

*Tamil Nadu came up with their view that*

- When the child is given counselling, only the parents of the child shall be near and not anybody else.
- If children commit any mistake, what is the Punishment? Shall we include the punishments or do's & dont's in the CPP ??

A general concern related to the reporting, complaint and case handling mechanism was reviewed by the floor. We had additional inputs from Ms Jency, Rev. Guido Falkenberg, Dr James Arputharaj and Mr Sathish Samuel. It is agreed that the immediate link on the complaint mechanism will be the Child Protection Officer at the individual organisation level and the next level the complaint is forwarded to local organisation and State CM CJ CPO attached to the State chapter who in turn will co-ordinate with the concerned local organisation and proceed further.





These concerns and inputs were presented in the plenary, which were facilitated by Ms. Jency and Dr John Devavaram and at the end after serious deliberations it is agreed by the floor accepted the revised version as the final version of CPP for CMCI. However this final version will still undergo a critical review at the proposed 2<sup>nd</sup> phase CPP training which is scheduled for May 2016.

## Log Frame for New Proposal

Having crossed almost seventeen months with the present project supported by KNH, the State chapters and National office prepared a detailed activity plan and systematic log frame for the next five years( log frame attached in this report). This was presented with introduction on the background preparatory work done by various teams by CMCJ Chairperson and one of the member on the Registered Board Mr.Dennyson James and Mr.Joseph Edmund. Both of them presented the background as well way forward for CMCJ as National movement.

- CMCJ is a unique movement initiated and led by children and youth themselves.
- KNH recognized the strength of children and taking the lead role to address issues concerning them, by making demand and self initiative on a participatory manner
- CMCJ is anchored on the basic principles of Child Rights, including Child Protection, non-discrimination and equity,
- Our Movement is set by Participatory process – engaging children, young people as change agents in addressing their Ecological Rights as part of overall Rights Perspectives
- It is enriched with diverse socio-cultural and ecological contexts across the States by bringing in sound evidence and success stories of adaptation and mitigation
- The Movement is moving towards scale, to bring benefits to as many children as possible, not only the present but also the future within each specific context.
- The Movement sets the ground for testing, constructive critiquing to strengthen individual skills talents of children.

There had been interesting pro and against discussion and debate around tapping resources from corporate sector since most of the corporate companies contribute to the maximum of carbon emission. However towards the end it is agreed that no doubt most of the companies contribute to damaging environment by pollution but still there many other companies which do not pollute

but still have resources under CSR. Hence it is important for CM CJ to identify such companies and tap resources.

Dr James Arputharaj, added to the debate that if CM CJ is interested he may assist and get the accreditation from one of the competent company in Delhi to receive CSR funds

### **Group work on Log frame for New Proposal**

Individual State Chapters have prepared independent log frame for their chapters at the State level. The National Office consolidated the points received from the State chapters and the same was presented for discussion among the members present for developing State versions for the next five years. The key objectives as presented for the small group discussion is given below.... (The output from small groups is attached to this Report as annex)

#### **Objective-1**

Widen a broad base movement led by children and youth to ensure ecological rights as a part of overall child rights

#### **Objective -2**

Fulfilment of CM CJ obligations in relation to the impacts of climate change on children from vulnerability and adaptation perspective, especially on Agriculture, health and NRM sectors

#### **Objective-3**

Influence decision makers and policy framework on alternate eco and child friendly pathways

**Objective-4** strengthen institutional framework both the national and state levels to enable CM CJ to independently function as children/ youth led organization

So the above objectives were discussed as groups and the outcomes were presented state wise by their representatives. They are as follows

#### **Odisha:**

- Forming CM CJ in village, block, Panchayat level leaders are required
- In the village level, village library may be established by collecting books from the passed out children
- Awareness of rights and drop outs in school
- Awareness among village members about sanitation, tree planting, etc.
- Establish anganwadis at the village level
- Awareness about using plastic bags
- Conducting sports tournaments
- Increasing members in other areas
- Children to be trained with child rights and leadership
- One representative meeting could be conducted each quarter.





## Tamil Nadu:

- Increasing membership to 30%
- New members should be aware about the activities
- Spreading CMCJ through new members
- Orientation about climate change
- Increasing knowledge about climate change
- Increasing membership through networking
- Setting up model village



## Andra Pradesh and Karnataka:

- Strengthen state membership
- Promote leadership and strengthen network
- Capacity building for CMCJ members
- Campaigning on millet department, seed bank in the three districts of Andra Pradesh
- Organize children festivals
- To study projects (marine, bio- diversity, medical plants, etc.)



After the group presentation Dr. John Devavaram suggested that CMCJ may consider adding thematic intervention related to mitigation and lobby and advocacy on yearly basis such as Plastic free villages, green cover villages, etc. But some state chapters and members are not accepted to the idea of thematic working since their budget may not be sufficient for other State activities already planned.



At this juncture Rev. Guido, India Team Leader KNHG, replied in response to the budget plans that KNH may support the National level, the expenses to 100% while the State level budget will be supported to the tune of 50% to support the office expenses, simple joint activities and salaries of the coordinators. The 50% may be budgeted into the State level convening organisation in their budget as per the agreed and approved action plan of CMCJ as one partner. The field level activities will be accommodated and supported by respective facilitating organisations thus all 100% activity based budgeting will be included into the respective partner budgets and this will not come from CMCJ budget.

Tamil Nadu and Odisha accepted the view but representatives from Andhra & Karnataka state chapters expressed that they are not in agreement with this proposal. It is expressed that the AP partners do not have sufficient funds to manage their children participate in various activities and also to participate in regular meetings. But in view of the time constraints associated with submission of new proposal, it is left to the chapter concerned to review their response among themselves and send in their reply to the National office before the end of February 2016.

Mr. Sathish – the Country Co-ordinator said this is the practice from the beginning followed in CMCJ. He further asked the Partners not to always depend on KNH for the funds. They may come up with new strategies in tapping out funds from the local contributions such as CSR. Only then CMCJ will really emerge as children led independent organisation and not always dependent on facilitating organisation or donors.

Rev. Guido also raised another related concern on the connectivity of such members if KNH support come to an end to any partner concerned. Towards this some of the already existing positive examples were cited such as SPEECH has out of KNH support but children from Tiruchuli and Sivakasi are still active in the movement and they directly contact the State office. Similarly CCRD has moved to Tiruvallur District but children from Chennai are still active and they are connected to the State Chapter directly and are active. They communicate on a regular basis through the Google discussion group as well email.

### **Observatory Comments**



Dr. James Arupatharaj – the Country Co-ordinator commented on behalf of the new KNH team. He started his speech saying that, “All good things come to an end at some point, but this is not the end, this is the beginning”. He also claimed to have been a great admirer of CMCJs growth over the years. According to him, if all the CMCJ partners continue to work in their targeted area, the vulnerability of children in India will go down drastically with time. He also said that all the activities should be carried out in the “Best of interest of the Children”. He asked us to concentrate on two important aspects, first one being Inclusiveness which means adding more people and the other important aspect is giving equal importance all the states. It does not mean that equal importance is not given to all the States in this floor but active and serious participation of all the States should be ensured and this has to come only from members themselves and not from adults.

He suggested that, adults should take back seats and children should be given bigger roles and additional responsibility and it would be really appreciable if children are able to organise the meetings. He also hinted that, it would be strategic for the national office to be located in New Delhi to get adequate network in the field.

He also came up with an activity called photo spacing to demonstrate how adults overshadow the children in term of responsibilities. Mr James repeatedly insisting on the adults giving children a greater role in CMCJ activities right from the facilitating organisation level. He also suggested that organising the next meeting at some tourist place as children will participate more enthusiastically. In the end he pointed out Rev. Guido’s statement “Children participation is very much dear to KNH, we need to put it in practice, We can prove it with CMCJ”.

## **Feedback session**

Sathyavani from Tamil Nadu shared that she is very much happy that all the states are involved as one for a good cause. It was also her first meeting. She is will to come regularly for all the meetings

Arun from Tamil Nadu said that he is very happy to be a part of CMCJ. Also he is happy that he got new friends from different States.

Naik from Odisha shared that this meeting is the first experience for him. He has learnt a lot of things and he will be sharing it with his village members when he returns back

Alagu from Tamil Nadu said that she was able to learn many new things. In the initial she was not able to pick up English. As there were translations she was able to understand in a better way. She further said that the group works were really useful for her.

Siva Bharathi from Tami Nadu has taken a decision that she will not use plastic bags anymore and also she will change her friends in school and villages. She further asked how many people are ready to support her from the floor from today?

Gopinath from Tamil Nadu was a bit scared in the first day of the meeting. Later he was able to adjust with all the members. Now he was able to get an idea about what is CMCJ all about. For the next meeting he will try bringing his friends to the meeting from his village.

Durga from Karnataka said that English was a big problem for her and she was not able to understand many things because there was no kanada translation. This also gives her the desire to learn many languages she added.

## **Drawing Competition Prize Distribution**

National office initiated a drawing challenge for children across the members in which morethan 500 children participated across the States. The challenge ws given on four broad themes....

- Theme 1. Climate change and Child rights
- Theme 2. Climate change mitigation
- Theme 3. Science behind Climate change
- Theme 4. Alternate energy and climate change





The shortlisted drawings from each of the facilitating organisations were displayed around the meeting hall for display and for the juries to make final selection. From the drawings displayed, a Jury team consisting of Rev.Guido, all four Co-ordinators jointly with some of the members selected overall six drawings (3 charts from Tamilnadu and 3 charts from Andhra and Odisha) as the most communicative imagination from the lot.
